

Swimrun Achievement in South Wales!

Claire Davidson, who is a teacher of English at the College, and her husband, took part in the Breca Gower Swimrun in South Wales during the summer. The 20km event, beginning at the stunning Oxwich Bay and finishing at Underhill Park, took in some of the most beautiful sights that the Gower Peninsula has to offer.

Swimrun is a point A to point B event. It begins with a short run until water is reached, then a swim until land is reached and so on. Competitors race in pairs usually, wearing a wetsuit, trainers, a pull buoy and paddles, and are often lashed together with a 2m bungee to ensure they don't become separated. It's also a handy tow rope when one member of the team becomes fatigued and needs a bit of help. Competitors start

together, run in their wetsuits, swim in their trainers and finish together.

The Davidsons were competing in their fifth Swimrun event. "I absolutely love this sport," said Mrs Davidson, "It is so much fun to compete with my husband, and work as a team throughout. We both know the Gower extremely well, and local knowledge of the rip currents gave us a lot of help on the swims. Unfortunately I struggled a bit on the second 7.8km run in my wetsuit. The coast path was extremely hilly and we lost a bit of ground."

After 2 hours and 56 minutes the Davidsons crossed the finish line in 7th place. "We did lose a few places in the latter stages of the race," said Mrs Davidson, "but as 43 mixed teams started the day, and 40 finished, I'm more than happy with that."



The Holiday Activity Programme at the College offers an abundance of opportunities for children aged 5 to 16 years. During this summer's activities Hannah Skelley, Services Manager at Tesco Ivybridge Lee Mill Extra, offered the participating children fruit and water as part of their FareShare campaign supporting local community groups. Having worked hard throughout the Plymouth Argyle training session, the fruit and water was very much appreciated at lunch time by the children."





In September, parents and carers once again joined Senior Leaders and staff members at the College for a successful face-to-face Parents' Feedback Forum. This time, the forum was focused upon Literacy, and held in the College's fantastic Learning Resource Centre, surrounded by books.

They had an opportunity to meet new staff, including Scott Davies, WeST's Executive Director of English who explained the core offer focused upon literacy, and new Assistant Principal, Vicky Thornton, who delivered a lesson using the College's Year 7 Forensic Reading lesson plans. They also heard from Holly Trafford, Librarian and Forensic Reading Lead, about the immersive experiences and competitions promoted by the Learning Resource Centre, and offered to all students at the College.

Students Celebrate Exam Results

Students celebrated success on their results days once again and we are extremely proud of each and every one of them. They received grades which are a testament to their hard work and commitment throughout their studies and which really promotes our mantra that hard work and effort every day really does pay off. We are confident that our students have the grades they fully deserve and which put them in a strong position to embark upon the next part of their learning journey.

A third of our A Level entries have achieved A* and A grade passes, with 61% of our students achieving A*-B grades in their courses. 12 students have achieved 3 or more A* or D* (Vocational) grades – the highest possible achievements, with

34 students achieving straight A/A* or D/D* grades.





Two of our highest achieving A Level students have realised their dreams of studying at Oxford and Cambridge, one for Biomedical Sciences and the other for Computer Science, with another student gaining a place at Birmingham University to study Medicine.

Reflecting on the GCSE results Rachel Hutchinson said, "It may have been a challenging year, but the students have been amazingly resilient and so committed to their studies. The staff could not have worked harder in supporting our students, going above and beyond their expected professional duties during such unprecedented times. I have seen first-hand how hard the students and staff have worked over the last year and I am confident that our students have valid, comparable and accurate grades that reflect their commitment. I cannot pass any judgement on the picture nationally, but we at Ivybridge Community College will be celebrating these results".

College excited as work starts on their new 3G Pitch

A grant has enabled the College to begin work on a new Artificial Grass Pitch, high-quality fencing, storage containers and spectator area. The work will greatly improve the quality and aesthetics of the existing surface. The pitch will be used by College students and teams alongside external and community organisations.

Funding has been sourced from Westcountry Schools Trust, Ivybridge Community College, Sport England, the Premier League and The Football Association (FA). Support and Section 106 funding has also been acquired from South Hams District Council, supported by Ivybridge Town Council Councillors, who see the redeveloped pitch as a significant investment for the town and for the community.

Helen Reddy, Director of Sport said: "The Artificial Grass Pitch will be a fantastic facility, giving opportunities to all our students, and the local community, regardless of whether they are using the pitch for PE lessons, enrichment or general leisure activities".

"To support our staff at the College, we have a number of



The 245 excited students spent a full day at the College, towards the end of their summer break, taking part in a diverse range of seven activities including circus skills, gymnastics, music, orienteering, problem solving, rugby, and team building. The new initiative was a timely occasion for the students, who were able to learn more about the College site, which can be a daunting prospect for newcomers, and it also gave them a preview of the College's enrichment opportunities.

"After such a turbulent couple of years for these young students, it was great to be able to show them that lyybridge Community College is friendly and welcoming," said Helen Reddy, Director of Enrichment and Sports Academy. "This is the first time that we have run a day like this for our new Year 7 students, and the goal was to show them that, despite being such a large campus, the College is not so daunting. COVID-19 restrictions have meant that primary school pupils have not been able to visit the College over the last 18 months, so the College took the first opportunity it could to make the day possible.


The Summer School Programme took place across four days, with our Years 8, 9, 10 and 11 students attending for two days, and our new Year 7 students attending for three.








Improving Understanding of Police in the Community

Year 13 Public Services students had the opportunity to experience a Hate Crime Workshop delivered by Graeme Kirkup, a former police officer, who is currently working for the Crime Commissioner.

The students are currently studying a unit of work looking at crime and its effects on society, so it was very beneficial for them to develop their understanding and awareness on hate crime, both locally and nationally.

He also explained what made a hate crime and gave local examples. Everything Graeme discussed has really helped us with our current assignment, and has given us ideas on how the police prevent crimes, support communities and victims."

Rhys also shared his experience of the workshop, saying, "I found the workshop very interesting, as we learned about aspects of the police force that we had not heard of before. It was definitely an eye opener as to how the force is perceived on the news. The talk has helped the whole class to see what the police deal with, what support they offer the community and how they can help to prevent crime."

BTEC Students Gain Level 2 Sports First Aid Qualification

Year 12 BTEC Sport students recently acquired the knowledge and skills to enable them to recognise and respond to injury and illness in various sporting contexts when they gained a valuable Level 2 First Aid qualification.

The course included resuscitation techniques, placing a patient into the recovery position and dealing with different types of injuries. The day was a blend of theory and practical with an examination in the afternoon to assess the students' practical skills and knowledge.

Jill Chapman, who was the course Tutor, and is also a Chartered and State Registered Physiotherapist, said, "Emergencies can strike at any moment during sports events and training sessions, so it's important to be prepared to handle it with the correct first aid training. The ten students who attended the training performed exceptionally well and took on all the information from the day, and this showed in their practical examination as well as their theory understanding."

Year 12 student, Elysia, who gained a qualification on the course, said, "The course has given me a chance to help and save people in need, which I couldn't have done before I attended the first aid course."

Critical thinking, Creativity and Cooperation

In November, the College welcomed the Army's Royal Electrical and Mechanical Engineers (REME) and Infantry Instruction Teams. They were onsite to deliver activities for students in Year 11 who had shown a particular interest in joining the Services as a possible future career.



Emily Impresses with Anatomical Art

Year 12 student, Emily, has impressed staff and students alike with her anatomical tortoise watercolour. This painting was submitted as an entry into the Nancy Rothwell Award, which is an annual competition hosted by the The Royal Society of Biology. Its aim is to celebrate specimen drawing and highlight the benefits of combining Art with Science.



Students studying A Level Biology and Art were invited to enter the competition, which is run in collaboration with the Royal Veterinary College and is open to entries worldwide. Emily found the time, after her mock examinations, to create a fantastic piece of anatomical art.

"Emily showcased her superb artistic skills, and an interest in reptilian anatomy, in a beautiful watercolour of a tortoise which she submitted digitally to the competition in July. Emily is an exemplary student who works hard, but also has an innate biological ability. She has had a very successful start to her A Level Biology studies, even with a significant amount of remote learning this year," Kate Allott, teacher of Biology.

A Practical Insight into STEM Career Opportunities

Biologists and Physicists in Year 12 were invited to attend a University of Exeter Biomedical Physics Group Talk and Workshop. Thirty students learned how we may be able to use a new Spectroscopy technique (Physics) to detect pre-cancerous cells (Biology). The workshop went through the basic science behind Raman and Brillouin spectroscopy, highlighting the importance of multidisciplinary teams in solving real-world problems and gave the students the opportunity to talk to biomedical physicists.

The presentation was organised by Dr Alice Mills, who founded the Exeter Science Centre, together with Dr Noemi Correa who is a Biomedical Physics Researcher involved in the project.

Following the workshop Year 12 Physicist, Caitlin, wrote, "The activities required using our knowledge of Physics and Biology, to apply it to an unfamiliar concept, and further consolidate the ideas that were introduced by the scientists. The workshop not only taught us about Brillouin and Raman spectroscopy, but also how the sciences overlap and are crucial to one another. The scientists spoke of their personal journeys from university to their position researching oesophageal cancer, emphasising the true magnitude of possibilities with pursuing a career in STEM. Overall, the workshop was very insightful in terms of our advancement with technology, but also the paths we can take to make a difference."

This competition looks to capture students' imagination and inspire them about the physics that is all around them in everyday life, and produced some very impressive entries.


Renewable Energy Session with the Exeter Science Centre

providing renewable electricity. During the session the class had to experiment with mini-solar panels in small groups to discover the best angle and compass direction to point the panels to be most efficient."




Creative 'Cell' Cake

Greenpower -A Driving Force for Girls in STEM



The College is delighted to be taking part in the Greenpower Electric Vehicles Challenge. This national competition is organised through the UK charity Greenpower Education Trust. The Trust inspires young people around the world to excel in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) through a unique challenge: to design, build and race an electric car. The project started during the first week of November and will run until June 2022 when they will compete in the regional Greenpower Race Day.

Craig Jewel, teacher of Physics at the College, is championing this initiative through his weekly Girls in Science Club. He said, "I am delighted that 15 girls have currently signed up for the club. We are also very fortunate that Western Power Distribution have funded us for the kits, tools and everything we need to compete. Luke Skorka-Brown from the College's Design and Technology Department, together with two Western Power Distribution engineers are also assisting the girls in building the car."

Nick South, Western Power Distribution's Education Liaison Officer said, "We decided to sponsor teams to encourage more girls to get involved with STEM projects. I visited the College with our STEM ambassadors to deliver the kit and to meet the team of enthusiastic engineers who will design, build and eventually race the car. I have no doubt that we have done well to secure this partnership with Ivybridge Community College."

Inspirational Festival of Physics at Exeter University

In November, Year 12 student Physicists, and Year 10 students from the College's Girls into STEM Group, had the opportunity to visit Exeter University and attend the Institute Of Physics' Festival of Physics. The students, accompanied by Craig Jewel, teacher of Physics, attended motivational talks, demonstrations and workshops all showing how Physics is part of our everyday lives.

Year 12 student, Toby, who attended the event said, "The Festival of Physic was one of the most informative College visits I have been on. Alongside informative lectures was an opportunity to gain an insight into some of

the fascinating, cutting-edge research being done at Exeter University within their Physics Department, and a chance to speak to some of the students about what they do over the course of their degree.

Highlights of the day included Professor Samble's lecture, The Wonder of Light, which included some breath-taking and remarkably colourful demonstrations. I also really enjoyed the explanation of the uses in gold nanoparticles and near infrared light in a non-invasive cancer therapy. This research is being conducted by, among others, Dr Charlie Jeynes (whom I

spoke to). Overall, I thoroughly enjoyed the day at the University of Exeter, and learnt many incredible things; I would definitely recommend the visit to anyone considering going in future years."



Ollie Secures 5th Place in National XC Championships

From June to September Ollie also competed in the HSBC National XC Race Series, finishing in eighth overall and placing fourth in the British Cycling National Rankings with 770 points.

Ollie said: "Being the regional champion at the start of the season was a great achievement for me and it helped build my confidence ahead of the National Series races. A podium position in the National

Championship would have been a dream come true, but with several of the best riders in the country who are a year older than me it was a tall order."

Ollie is now preparing a training plan for 2022, with the aim of a top three podium finish in both the National Series and the National Championships.



Year 10 student, Adam Dingley, represented Devon in the English Schools Athletics Association (ESAA) Combined Events Championship in Bedford. He was part of the Devon Junior Boys Pentathlon team that placed fifth in the finals. The national championships saw Adam performing the 80m hurdles, shot put, long jump, high jump and 800m.

Year 11 students, Fin Mulville and Ollie Hicks have recently won the 2021 CPGA Cornish Pilot Gig Rowing Championships.


