

- A selection of eMagazines are available on RB Digital Devon.
- A range of eAudiobooks via BorrowBox.
- Online reference resources at <u>Devon</u> Libraries including AncestryUK, Oxford dictionaries and Naxos music.
- Fun online content and live streaming events via social media. Check out individual library Facebook pages for more information.

Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)

Thanks if you have replied to Ms Daniel expressing interest in taking an EPQ next academic year. If you are interested and haven't conatacted her yet, please do so, so that we can timetable the course with the appropriate number of supervisors.

As I mentiond last week, the Univeristy of Bath has produced a MOOC through FutureLearn, called How to succeed in your EPQ: The nuts and bolts of completing your Project ((https://www.futurelearn.com/courses/epq-success). Ms Daniel asks that you complete this course before the end of the summer term if you are serious about taking the EPQ. It takes three weeks; you can either start now, or you can join the course on 11 May or 29 June (see details on the webpage), so you do not need to start this until after the Diagnostic Assessment week at the beginning of June.

OXPLORE

Stretch yourself - Oxplore

I previously shared a number of suggestions for super-curricular

activities that you could engage in to extend your studies beyond the remit of your Sixth Form syllabuses. Another resource popped into my inbox this week: Oxplore. This is an online resource produced by the University of Oxford, marketed by them as the 'Home of Big Questions'. It aims to engage students with debates and ideas that go beyond what is covered in the classroom, reflecting the kind of thinking undertaken by students at university, from areas such as Archaeology to Zoology. Free University of Plymouth webinars

Another excellent way of stretching yourself is being provided by the University of Plymouth through a series of upcoming webinars, the first being an A Level Geography session focusing on 'Changing Places: Rebranding Urban and Rural Areas' by *Professor Richard Yarwood* of the <u>School of Geography</u>, <u>Geology and Environmental Sciences</u>. It will run as a talk, with opportunities to ask questions at

the end. Professor Yarwood has delivered a similar talk at the College many times in the past.

This talk focuses on the 'Changing Places' theme of the A-level curriculum. It examines the economic changes that have been affected urban and rural places over the past twenty years and, in particular, stresses the importance of re-branding in these transformations. Drawing on case studies, Professor Yarwood examines how urban and rural places are marketing themselves as part of wider regeneration strategies.

for Education has put together *The Skills Toolkit* (https://theskillstoolkit.campaign.gov.uk/), an online resource containing free digital and numeracy courses, to help people build up their digital skills from home during the coronavirus outbreak. This may be worth a look for some of you.






Post-College pathways
