# Curriculum and Courses

There are a wide range of courses available in our Sixth Form with a good level of flexibility in the options students can choose.

We currently offer over 40 different courses in our Sixth Form.

• The majority of these are GCE A Level subjects, which all have examinations at the end of Year 13.

We also have a growing number of vocational qualifications on offer:

 Subsidiary Diplomas and Certificates (equivalent to one or two A Level subject choices)

These are typically coursework based, but do contain an element of formal examination as well. Some of these qualifications can be studied alongside A Level courses.

### What could your programme of study look like?

All students must choose a three-course programme of study. You are allowed to study four courses; however, this is very demanding. All student must have at least a three-course programme of study that must include at least one A Level.

We strongly recommend that all students choose a 3.5 model pathway including one of our AS Levels or equivalents.

## The '.5 Option': The EPQ, Core Maths, Further Maths, AS Languages

We recommend all students study a 3.5 programme. These are completed during Year 12 and allow all students an enriched curriculum.

#### The Extended Project Qualification (EPQ)

This is an opportunity to carry out a project in an area or subject you feel passionate about.

It requires over 90 hours of work, so it is important that you enjoy working on your chosen project. Your final submission has a great deal of flexibility, such as a written report, organising a charity event or even creating a computer game. All students must also give a presentation about their project.

This is a great opportunity to develop your skills in:

- Independent learning
- Planning and organising
- Researching, analysing and evaluating
- Creatively problem solving
- Taking the initiative

### **Core Maths**

This is an opportunity to study Maths beyond GCSE but not to A Level. It is well regarded by employers for skills you acquire, particularly in problem solving. It is an excellent support to other subjects, including Geography, Business and Applied Business, Psychology, PE, Economics, Biology, Chemistry and Applied Science.

### **Further Maths**

Enhance your A Level Maths course with an additional Further Maths AS. This is an excellent opportunity to extend your mathematical skill set in Pure Maths, Mechanics and Statistics developed in A Level Maths without committing to the full A Level Further Maths. This could really help support your application and for you to stand out in competitive University courses and in a future career.

#### AS French or Spanish

Enhance your three main subjects with an additional language qualification. This is an excellent opportunity to extend your learning from GCSE without committing to the full A Level. This would help develop excellent linguistic skills which could really help your application stand out in a future competitive world.

These AS qualifications are completed in Year 12.

# Excellence

### **Independent Study**

We recognise that the transition from Year 11 to the Sixth Form can be a big step. It is vital to realise the importance of independent study from the outset and it is expected that you use your non-timetabled lesson time productively. Sixth Form study can be demanding, but if you stay on top of your work, you will find it much more rewarding and enjoyable!

It is essential that you plan your time well and acquire good study skills. For every subject you study, you will have one timetabled study block per fortnight. This is to help you organise your time most effectively as you move from Year 11 to Sixth Form. During all other non-timetabled blocks, there is greater flexibility, but we do expect you to be using your time productively. We recommend that you allocate specific subject or study objectives for each of your non-timetabled blocks and there will be time and support during Tutor block to help you with this.

I volunteer at Ugborough football club every Saturday morning from 9:30am-11am. I aim to use this as experience to become a level 1 FA coach, from there I can take on a role as a coach for younger children and hope to help them love football as much as I do.

### Tips on choosing the right courses

The process of choosing your Sixth Form subjects is different for everyone, but here are some tips.

- If you have a career in mind, research routes and qualifications you might need.
- Think of how your subject choices might complement each other and provide a broad foundation for your future endeavours.
- Think about how different courses might complement each other in terms of the type of study required - you may want to give yourself some diversity.
- Think about how much you enjoy a subject rather than how good you are
   you need to stay motivated!
- Speak to your current teachers about your suitability for your chosen courses.
- Find out about the course content and, importantly, how you will be assessed
   play to your strengths!
- Speak to current Sixth Form students to get a student perspective.

Study in the Sixth Form is not just about your academic work. There are also many extra opportunities available throughout your time here to widen your skills and experiences and help you be successful beyond Sixth Form.

### **Enrichment Opportunities**

There are many clubs and societies that offer great opportunities to develop your wider skills in areas such as sport, music, performing arts, communication, leadership, mentoring and coaching and not least, to have some fun!

We would encourage all of our students to get involved in some kind of enrichment activity to support their study.

### Community and Service

We encourage all of our students to get involved in volunteering within the wider College and community. It is a time to show leadership and be of service to others. Typical activities include voluntary work in hospitals and primary schools, work with the elderly, College clubs, mentoring younger students, assisting in lessons in the lower school, being a book buddy and sports coaching. We strongly believe that our students can make a meaningful contribution to the lives of others.

As part of your programme of study in the Sixth Form, we expect all students to sign up for at least one hour per week of voluntary work.

# Preparing for the Future

### **Pastoral Support**

Above all, we want our students to be happy – confident that they have tools to excel in their chosen subjects and supported in securing their future pathways - their academic success follows naturally from this. We have a dedicated Pastoral team in the Sixth Form including two non-teaching Pastoral Leaders, one for Welfare and one for Futures and Careers.

At the heart of our pastoral system is a student's Tutor, who sees them through Years 12 and 13.

Students meet with their Tutor daily, which is important for building a relationship that allows a Tutor to provide emotional support. Students will also receive a one-hour PSHE lesson each fortnight from a dedicated PSHE team of teachers. This PSHE provision in the Sixth Form underpins our Enrichment programme; research has shown that students with higher levels of emotional, social and behavioural well-being have higher levels of academic achievement and engagement, now and in the future.

Sessions have been tailored towards the Sixth Formers as young adults, and every care has been taken to focus on future career planning too, whether that constitutes an apprenticeship, a university application or a GAP year, in order to prepare for responsibilities and experiences in later life.

We aim to create and deliver sessions that allow the students to develop habits of good living and to create an environment where they can flourish as a human being, both currently and later in life.

Sixth Form is a crucial stepping stone to a student's career aspirations, and much support is given through the pastoral system in securing students' post-Sixth Form pathways, be they Higher Education,

apprenticeship or employment. We are extremely proud of what our students go on to achieve. Our annual Futures Week, apprenticeship workshops, careers fairs, Year 12 work experience, talks from local employers, and sharing of local employment and internship opportunities are just some of the many ways that we support students in reaching their goals.

### Successful Learning

We believe strongly that a student's academic success in Sixth Form is less of a function of innate ability and more one of developing the right combination of character traits for successful learning.

Fortnightly assemblies, activities in Tutor time and academic mentoring throughout the year are used to build the characteristics of successful learners and help students to fulfill their potential.

In short, as described in the VESPA model of Oakes and Griffin (2015), the characteristics of a successful learner are:

• Vision a knowledge of what you want to achieve

• Effort a willingness to put in many hours of proactive

independent study

Systems a robust system for organising your learning

resources and time

Practice practising and developing the skills required

by the course

• Attitude being able to respond constructively to setbacks

Based on our regular reporting system, we also identify students who could benefit from extra support and use the VESPA model as a basis for tailoring one-to-one mentoring to enable them to achieve their potential.

Importantly, such help is always available on request from a member of the Sixth Form team for any student and we aim to involve parents in the process as much as they wish.

# **Facilities**

As a Sixth Form student, you have access to the extensive and high-quality facilities throughout the College. In addition, there are Sixth Form only areas to support your studies and development at College:

The **Sixth Form Learning Resource Centre** is a supervised study area, available throughout the College day. Here, you have access to computers and software, photocopying on a 'pay as you go' system, reference books (many also available in the main College Learning Resource Centre) and Higher Education prospectuses.

The **Neil Maythorne study area** is a large work area with desks and computers, available to use for both independent and group work. This area is supervised at times during the day.

The **Sixth Form Common Room** is a more flexible space, used for social time and study time and is available to use throughout the day.

**H107** is our newest study space that we share with Exams. H107 is a quiet and focused study room with study spaces and computers for you to use. This is where you will be expected to sign in and spend your designated study blocks. H107 is supervised throughout the day.

**The Vine** is a Sixth Form and staff only catering facility located in the Sixth Form Common Room serving breakfast, lunch, coffee and snacks throughout the day.

### The Bursary

The 16-19 Bursary Fund aims to help young people facing financial hardship to stay on in full-time education. Students may use bursary payments for transport, educational visits and equipment.

Applications for the Bursary can be made in September when further information will also be given to students.

### **Transport**

Unfortunately, Post-16 students must pay for their travel into College.

If you need to travel into College by bus, it is important that you apply for a place on one of our buses. This can be done in June.

For 'in-catchment' students, buses are run by Devon County Council. We offer our own buses for students from further afield. You can visit our website for information on bus routes, links to Devon County Council and our dedicated bus email address.

A limited number of parking spaces are also available for Sixth Form students when the time arises.

Application forms can be obtained via the Sixth Form office and permits will be issued accordingly.

### The Application Process

This is an important time for all students; you are making key decisions about the next stage in your learning. Whether you are applying from Ivybridge Community College or from another school, we are here to support and guide you through this process.

January	Open morning for prospective students. Applications to be completed online by the published deadline
January/February/March	You will be invited to a bespoke interview with one of the Sixth Form team who will talk through your application and programme of study with you to ensure that you have made choices that are right for you. You will be offered support, advice and guidance about your chosen courses and you will have the opportunity to ask any questions you might have.
June	Induction Day for all applicants where you will have taster sessions in your chosen courses, gain access to summer work and meet the Sixth Form Team.  There will also be an Information Evening for Parents
August	GCSE results day. The Sixth Form team will be available all day and the days following results to offer advice, guidance and support in light of GCSE results. Your programme of study is finalised, and we enrol you onto your courses.
September	Welcome to Ivybridge Sixth Form. This is when your courses start.  There will also be a day of induction activities which students are expected to attend
